School Community Opportunity: Caring Citizens

Local business, OC Beauty, has collaborated with 12 women-owned and LGBTQ+ businesses to gather donations for those who cannot afford feminine hygiene products. Organizers are looking for donations of pads, tampons, liners, and other menstrual hygiene products.

The goal is to collect over 1,000 menstrual products and donations will be accepted at the following locations: 705 Esthetics, Aline Wellness, Amore, Anthesis, Great Lakes Honda, Hogan's Homestead Gift Shop, OC Beauty, Ontario Wild, Scott Coffee, Stork and Bundle, Tamar's Trends, and The Country Way.

Donations will be collected between March 1st - March 8th.

Period poverty describes the difficulty in affordability and access to menstrual hygiene products that many women and menstruating people face. Studies show that the cost of these products can be up to \$6000 in a lifetime (Craggs, 2018, as cited in Canadian Public Health Association). Although often available free of cost in schools, about a quarter of menstruating Canadians cannot afford these items — specifically houseless, low-income, and other marginalized folks.



Staff and students are invited to participate in this excellent community outreach opportunity and to demonstrate that ADSB students truly are *caring citizens*!

International Day For The Elimination Of Racial Discrimination



25%	of discrimination complaints received by the Canadian Human Rights Commission in 2016 relate to race, colour, national or ethnic origin, and/or religion.
17%	Hate crimes targeting Muslims accounted for 17% of all hate crimes in Canada in 2017.
18%	Hate crimes targeting the Jewish population accounted for 18% of all hate crimes in Canada in 2017.
27%	27% of the federal prison population in 2017 were Indigenous people, who only comprised 4.1% of the Canadian population.
40%	Employers are about 40% more likely to interview a job applicant with an English-sounding name despite identical education, skills and experience. (Canada.ca)

On February 6th, a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck southern Türkiye and Syria. Horrifically, on February 20th, another magnitude 6.3 aftershock struck the Türkiye-Syria border. 

HAPPY INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY!



International Women's Day is celebrated globally and annually on March 8th. Inspired by the labour movements of the early 20th century, International Women's Day has been formally recognized since 1975. It is a day to recognize and celebrate women's and girl's social, economic, cultural, and political achievements. As we celebrate these incredible accomplishments and ongoing progress, we must also recognize the magnitude of work that remains to be done to achieve gender equity.

Today we must also acknowledge the disparity that exists for women; that diverse identities also mean diverse struggles. We cannot frame the experiences of "women" in a singular lens. The term *intersectionality* or *intersectional* was coined by Kimberlé Crenshaw in 1989 and describes how race, class, gender, and other individual characteristics "intersect" with each other to shape our lived experiences. In conversations about women and equity, we often ignore the varying experiences of Indigenous women, women of colour, women with disabilities, queer women, transgender women, and women who are economically disadvantaged. We must acknowledge that women can face many different types of oppression simultaneously based on their various social identities.

The 2023 International Women's Day Theme is **#EmbraceEquity**. This year, the focus is on understanding that "equal opportunities are no longer enough".

In fact, they can be "exclusionary rather than inclusive."

Equality means each individual is given the same resources. Equity recognizes that each person has different circumstances and thus requires different resources and opportunities to reach an equal outcome.

"When we embrace equity, we embrace diversity, and we embrace inclusion" (International Women's Day).
